# Best Practices for Refugee Status Determination: Principles and Standards for State Responsibility

Monash University Prato Centre, Italy  
29 & 30 May, 2008



The purpose of this conference is to bring together a group of practitioners, academics, decision-makers and policy makers from common law and civil law jurisdictions, including the EU, to consider the question of 'best practices' for refugee status determination in the current global 'crisis' of asylum. As is well known, the trend in developed countries is to introduce increasingly restrictive measures on access to asylum procedures. This policy of avoidance of responsibility includes the following practices:

- 'Safe third country' concepts which promote the 'containment' of refugees in regions close to their country of origin.
- Interception and off-shore processing of asylum seekers.
- The promotion of efficiency and security at the expense of accuracy.

Collectively, these practices amount to an abdication of the responsibilities of signatories to the Refugee Convention.

This conference will examine and reassert the responsibilities of states to asylum seekers under international human rights law and under the Refugee Convention. It will provide a forum for the exchange of practical experiences from different jurisdictions and provide guidance to emerging jurisdictions such as South Africa, Israel and African nations.

It is intended that the conference proceedings will be published in a monograph.

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# Call for Abstracts

Proposals for abstracts (30 minutes including 10 minutes for discussion) are invited.

**Deadline for submission of abstracts is Friday, 7 December 2007.**

## Suggested topics / themes for Call for Abstracts or Panels

- **Access to refugee status determination** – primary decision-making, multidisciplinary decision-making (including mental health impacts), cross-cultural elements of decision-making including race, age and gender, provision of advice and representation, regulation of migration practitioners. Fast-track procedures and time-limits. Offshore processing and excision of territory.
- **Standards for refugee protection** – legislative definition of ‘refugee’ versus the Convention, application of the exclusion clauses, including cessation clauses, internal flight option, sur place claims, internal flight, non-state actors. Consistency of standards amongst states. Application of the *non-refoulement* standard. Complementary protection versus Convention protection.
- **Tribunal decision-making** – including training in relation to vulnerable applicants (for example, unaccompanied child applicants), evidentiary issues, standard of proof, collection and use of country information, adversarial and inquisitorial procedures, case management and fast tracking, constitutional status of tribunal, control of procedures, use of guidelines, fairness versus efficiency. Qualifications of decision-makers.
- **Appeals and Review** – access to effective appeals or judicial review, use of administrative discretions.

- submitted by email as an attachment
